# EMERGENCE OF STATE AND MONARCHY IN NORTH INDIA

 Use of Iron from 600 BC > warrior class played important part- new agricultural tool> peasants produced surplus> surplus products collected by princes to meet their military and administrative needs.



- Surplus also to feed in towns> these material advantage enabled people to stick to their land and also to expand at the cost of neighbouring areas > rise of large states with towns strengthened the territorial ideas.
- While there were territorial ideas, people owed strong allegiance to Janapada(territory to which they belonged) and not to Jana (tribe which they belonged)..



- Janapada: Land where Jana(people, clan or tribe) settled.
- Iron tools> Agriculture expansion> Importance of Gangetic plain> Urbanism > Socio economic classes transformed to state organs and the occupation specialisation supported the state as being state collectors and other administrative works > Formation of monarchy in Gangetic plain while republics in foothills of Himalaya and Terai region of Nepal.



- Tribal identities in Early Vedic period > tribal identities merged with territorial identities in Later Vedic period > various territorial identities combined to form one territorial state > Janapadas > Mahajanapadas.
- Janapadas are small kingdoms of Vedic age > with development of iron, the Janapadas became more powerful and evolved into Mahajanapadas.
- So, Jana > Janapada > Mahajanapada > Empire



 Mahajanapadas(16 states): Monarchical states and few Gana Sanghas (Malla and Licchavis).



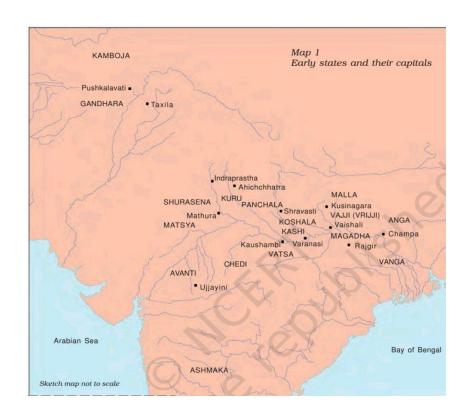

## **MAHAJANAPADAS**





- Anga: Capital is in Champa-Presently Bihar.
- Magadha: Rajagriha and Pataliputra-Bihar.
- Malla: Gana Sangha Kushinagara and Pavapuri- Uttar Pradesh.
- Vajji: Gana Included 8 clans among which Lichchavis were most powerful with capital Vaishali- Bihar - Later a Mahajanapada).



- Kosala Sravasti-Uttar Pradesh.
- Kasi Varanasi- U.P.
- Kuru Later became a Gana- Indraprastha
   Delhi.
- Vatsa Kaushambi U.P.
- Panchala Ahichatra and Kampila U.P



- Matsya : Viratnagar-Rajasthan
- Sursena : Mathura- U.P.
- Avanti : Ujjain and Mahishmathi- Madhya
   Pradesh
- Ashmaka: Potana Maharashtra.
- Kamboja : Rajapur-Kashmir.
- Gandhara : Taxila Pakistan
- Chedi: Suktimathi- debate of Madhya
   Pradesh or U.P.



- Anguttara Nikaya: 'Shodasha Mahajanapada'.
- Kasi( famous for textile and horses) Vajji( matrimonial alliance with Magadha)- Vatsa( famous for cotton and fabrics)-Malla(performed last rites of Buddha).
- Matsya(Rigveda mention it)- Ashmaka(the only southern Mahajanapada).



- Pradyota, patronised Buddhism, was the ruler of Avanti and Magadha and said to have conquered Kosambi too)-Koshala(city of Ayodhya).
- Northern Black Polished Ware(NBPW).



#### **GANA SANGHAS**

- Oligarchy or confederate clans.
- Two types: All or a section of clans(
   Sakyas and Koliyas) and confederation of several clans(Vajjis and Yadavas).
- Shakyas
- Mallas
- Bidesha





- Jnaapti(giving notice), Karma Vacha (resolutions), Rajan or Sangha Mukhya( chiefs of executive Government), Uparajan(vice consul), Samastagara(council).
- In some cases, oligarchy system replaced by chieftain system( Shakya splitting from Kosala).
- Decline due to reasons such as defeated by monarchs, geographical reasons, failure of governance system, etc.
